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Our perspective - where are we coming from?

- National development agency for the arts
- Strategy and vision that forefronts artists and principles of equality and inclusion
- We recognise there are barriers inc grants to artists who are in receipt of disability benefits

- We have advocated on these concerns
- Equality, Diversity and Inclusion Policy / Paying the Artist Policy
- Track record in policy, programmes and funding for the development of arts and disability as an area of arts practice



What is the Green Paper on Disability Reform?

- A proposal from Department of Social Welfare – for consultation – on how disability supports might be offered in the future
- Arising from:
- Indecon 'Cost of Disability Study' 2021
- → Roadmap for Social Inclusion strategy
- → Pathways to Work strategy
- At proposal stage only important to respond – for everyone to have their say.

Proposes

- to replace the multiple existing welfare schemes for people with disabilities
- with a single scheme
- offer 3-tiers of supports based on an assessment of a person's 'ability to work'
- Described as a proposal to <u>target</u> resources and remove anomalies



Green Paper on Disability ReformShaping our response

- Reviewed the proposal, attended consultations run by DSP – heard concerns expressed on core issues, core questions
- Arts Council not a mandated 'representative' organisation
- Arts Council to focus on implications for disabled artists and our role as a public body committed to equality, diversity and inclusion

- Concerns the new approach may not deliver benefits for artists
- Envisage proposal focused around two core themes:
 - The rights of people with disabilities to participate in arts and culture
 - And need for disability supports to reflect <u>how artists work</u>



The right to participate in arts and culture

- United Nations Universal <u>Declaration</u> of Human Rights
- Everyone has the right to freely participate in the cultural life of the community
- The UN <u>Convention</u> on the Rights of Persons with Disabilities
- persons with disabilities...opportunity to develop and utilise their creative, artistic and intellectual potential...for their own benefit...also for the enrichment of society
- Public Sector Equality and Human Rights Duty (Irish Legislation)

- Currently we can't offer meaningful support to disabled artists on the same grounds as that offered to non-disabled artists.
- This undermines our ability to comply with that Public Sector and Human Rights duty



Green Paper on Disability ReformHow Artists work

- Precarious working conditions inherent in the nature of working in the arts
- Current Social Welfare Scheme for Professional Artists on Jobseeker's Allowance
- allocates a 'status' to artists within the welfare system
- → an acknowledgment by Welfare that work in the arts is characterized by certain challenges that require a specific social welfare response or merit exceptions.
- A core principle informing more specific asks.

- Exempting grants from means testing
- Disregard thresholds
- Excluding project costs from assessment of means
- Flexibility and movement with work patterns
- Informing assessments on capacity to work / choice to work in the arts
- Potential of Basic Income for the Arts?
