









WELCOME

The Night-time Economy Taskforce, was established by Minister Catherine Martin on 30 July 2020. It affords an opportunity for relevant stakeholders from across the night-time culture sector to develop an innovative approach to supporting and developing a vibrant, diverse, and sustainable night-time economy in Ireland.

As a member of the Night Time Economy Taskforce, the Arts Council is responsible for a number of actions in the Report including Action 3 below.

The key focus of Action 3 is to:



Host an annual forum to develop and encourage new initiatives and partnerships and new thinking which could include several specific initiatives arising from the sector to be held annually.


Located in the city centre, in the heart of Georgian Dublin, the National Gallery is easily accessible on foot and by public transport.

Entrances


There are two entrances into the Gallery: one is located on Merrion Square West, and another is located on Clare Street. You are welcome to use either entrance (or both).




Ruth McGowan
