We will support artists from diverse backgrounds, across disciplines and at all stages of their careers to develop their practice, to collaborate, and to be ambitious when making work with and for children and young people.

In line with our **Paying the Artist** policy, we will continue to advocate for and support fair pay and conditions for artists who work with and for children and young people, and explore pathways to support artists to have sustainable careers and to be fairly paid for their work.

In line with our **International Arts** policy, we will continue to encourage artists and organisations to engage with and avail of EU investment and initiatives and other international partnerships that support them to develop their work for and with children and young people in collaboration with international colleagues, and that support young people to exchange artistic ideas with their counterparts in other countries.

What we will do next

We will work with partners to ensure that our funding and supports are available and accessible to artists from a range of backgrounds that are reflective of the diversity of children and young people in Ireland – including new applicants; applicants with disabilities; applicants from diverse racial and ethnic backgrounds; and applicants whose first language is not English or Irish.

As the Arts Council develops and implements our **Irish Language Arts** policy, we will work with partners in the Gaeltacht and Irish-language organisations to ensure our range of funding and supports are available and accessible to artists and arts organisations working with children and young people through the Irish language.

We will ensure diverse representation on our peer-panel lists, including young panellists aged 16+ from diverse backgrounds.

We will work with education partners to ensure that a greater diversity of children and young people who wish to develop a career in the arts and creative industries have opportunities to develop the skills, knowledge and experience that will help them reach their full potential. What will we have achieved?

OPPORTUNITIES

Artists from diverse backgrounds will gain more opportunities to develop their skills and careers in the area of children and young people's arts.

CONDITIONS

Artists will have better pay and working conditions in safe places and spaces to make and present their work with and for children and young people.

RECOGNITION

Artists and their role in supporting the arts in the lives of children and young people will be better understood and valued by policymakers and the public through our advocacy and communications.

We will invest in children and young people's arts in every city and county. We will do this through our local-authority partnerships; initiatives such as Culture Night and Creative Places; as well as direct investment in artists and organisations across Ireland.

We will work with our partners in education to ensure that children and young people have access to high-quality arts experiences as part of their early learning and care, primary, post-primary, further and higher education.

We will continue to support the work of the National Council for Curriculum and Assessment where appropriate. For example, we will continue to support its work to introduce a new specification for Leaving Certificate drama, theatre and film studies; and we will collaborate and provide advice in relation to curriculum development in arts education and other areas that are enhanced by engagement with the arts.

What we will do next

Through our investments and partnerships, we will seek to ensure that more children and young people can engage with the arts at home and in the wider community, in public spaces and in nature.

We will encourage the artists and arts organisations in which we invest to maximise their reach and impact by partnering with the education settings and child and youth services through which public policy for children and young people is implemented at local and national levels.

We will reflect on findings from our new Arts in Early Learning Pilot and continue to work with partners to promote key principles for engaging with the arts in early learning and care in line with Aistear and Síolta and in support of the First Five Strategy.

As we continue to review our support for residencies in higher education institutions, we will reflect on how we can best support the initial and continuing professional development of artists, educators and other professionals who can play a key role in how children and young people experience the arts.

What will we have achieved?

EQUITY

Spatial distribution of our funding for children and young people's arts across the country will be fair and equitable.

KNOWLEDGE

An accessible national resource to support spatial and demographic planning in the arts will be developed.

COLLABORATION

Stronger relationships will exist with our public-sector partners in governance, strategy and implementation.

SPACES

Better infrastructural places for artists, including young artists, will be developed in partnership with the government, local government and stakeholders.

We will continue to ensure, and increase where possible, targeted budgetary provision to support children and young people's engagement with the arts.

We will continue to engage in strategic partnerships and initiatives that can help children take part in the arts, and that can maximise the impact of our investments.

We will support the delivery of programmes by artists and arts organisations that serve the children and young people in their communities.

Across all of our investments, we will champion high-quality arts experiences and the ways in which these experiences support the quality of children and young people's lives.

What we will do next

We will ensure that our funding programmes, guidelines and criteria for assessment reflect our policy and support us to achieve our vision for children and young people's arts.

We will seek to increase our support for arts initiatives that are relevant and accessible to children and young people in challenging circumstances, such as those in hospital, experiencing homelessness, direct provision, asylum from war or other forced migration, children with disabilities or additional needs, and those experiencing poverty or other forms of exclusion.

We will partner with relevant organisations – and will support artists and arts organisations to work in partnership with others – so as to develop meaningful programmes that can ensure children in challenging circumstances are prioritised and supported to participate in the arts.

What will we have achieved?

ACCESSIBILITY

Applicants will find it easier to apply for funding and report on their work.

FLEXIBILITY

Improved flexibility in how we invest in the arts and public engagement in the arts.

ACKNOWLEDGEMENT

Published data and narratives that show the unique value of investment in the arts.

We will continue to support organisations that provide high-quality opportunities for young people to develop their skills across a range of art forms not widely available to children and young people in school, including architecture, circus, dance, theatre, film and animation.

What we will do next

We will seek to ensure that our support and development of children and young people's arts are to the fore in delivering on our climate policy. We will encourage artists and organisations working with children and young people to develop robust practices in this area.

We will listen to children and young people and other stakeholders as we review and renew our funding programmes so as to ensure our application processes are accessible to a broader diversity of applicants who can support children and young people's engagement with the arts.

We will seek to improve opportunities for 16–24-year-olds who wish to develop their skills and experience to a high level, including those who wish to develop a career in the arts; those who wish to continue to actively participate in the arts as adults; and those who wish to engage their peers and younger children in the arts.

What will we have achieved?

RELATIONSHIPS

Reinforced partnerships and alliances between the arts and wider society.

PATHWAYS

More equitable pathways for children and young people to develop their skills in the arts so that they can avail of further opportunities and continue their journey with the arts as adults.

What we will do next	What will we have achieved?
With our Dance team, we will pilot Centres for Advanced Dance Training. These will seek to improve the availability of specialist dance training, across genres, to young people. The pilot will seek to redress the financial and spatial barriers to dance training, enabling a greater diversity of young people to develop their skills to a high level.	
With our Music team, we will work in partnership with others to explore equitable and affordable pathways for children and young people from all backgrounds and regardless of financial means to develop their skills to play and perform music, including opportunities to reach the standard required to play with our national youth orchestras and ensembles.
