


The changing landscape of small and voluntary festival models

The Arts Council shares reporting insights from festivals supported through the Festival Investment Scheme.

• Small festivals demonstrate an ability to diversify income streams over the period. Between 2010-2018 activity income remains the highest source of income in small festival programmes. In 2020 most income streams see a downward trend due to the pandemic; activity income falls from €1.8 million (29%) in 2018 to a low of 229,803 (8.8%) in 2020.


- While income streams show improvement in 2021, the income profile changes: benefit-in-kind rising to a value of €1.3 million; local authority supports also increasing significantly during this year; activity income shows signs of recovery here.
- In 2021 the Arts Council's funding represented €1.75 million (31%) of the total income.



Audience attendance and ticket sales 2010-2021

- Audience attendance and ticket sales have followed a similar trend over the period. In 2020 free audience attendances rose by 194% from 315,000 to 926,172 as festival programmes pivot to digital transmission during the pandemic; paid attendance declines to a record low of 8.5% (47,612). A return to in-person programmes from 2020 sees free audience attendance fall by 40% (508,476) in 2021; a small recovery in paid attendances in the same year.
- Breakdown of audience attendance from a total viewership of 550,000 in 2021: online attendances 495,000 (90%), inperson attendance 55,000 (10%).
- From 2018 the audience profile in attendance type changes with a decline in paid audiences and a growth in free attendances; a reversal of this trend takes place in 2021 as in-person attendance improves and online reduces.

Kim Cook Director, Creative Initiatives, Burning Man Project

Kim is a change-maker and strategist working on the frontier of collaborations that extend Burning Man culture into the world. Drawing on a deep and varied well of experience in creative placemaking, performing arts, and nonprofit finance, Kim successfully builds urban, regional, national, and international projects that increase mutual understanding, advance civic wellbeing, elevate cultural engagement, and further the aesthetic design elements of communities.

TAKING ACTION: MOVING TOWARDS SUSTAINABLE FESTIVAL FUTURES



Patrick Lonergan (Panel Chair) University of Galway

Patrick Lonergan is Professor of Drama and Theatre Studies at the University of Galway, and is Chair of the Board of Galway International Arts Festival.
